Dear Friends,

At the beginning of Autumn and as we start a new Methodist year, it may stir in you many different emotions. This will depend on what your experience has been in the last 12 months. Reflecting and giving thanks to God is a natural human need and indeed it is what we do in wor-

ship. It may have been that at the time of some of these events you felt God was far away. But in looking back you can see that God carried you through. The Footprints poem might help has you do that reflecting.

One night I dreamed a dream. I was walking along the beach with my Lord. Across the dark sky flashed scenes from my life. For each scene, I noticed two sets of footprints in the sand, one belonging to me and one to my Lord.

He whispered, "My precious child, I love you and will never leave you, never, ever, during your trials and testings. When you saw only one set of footprints, it was then that I carried you."

There is of course not just looking back but looking forward to in faith and hope for the New Year. Some churches hold their annual Covenant Service in September and use it to commit to following the way of Christ. There is also the great thanksgiving of Harvest. Always a joy to share in worship giving thanks for God's provision. Of course, we have many to thank for the harvest especially those who work on the land.

As for the work of the church we long and look for Harvest of lost souls. Seeking to help people to discover the wonder of Faith in Christ. It is always a delight to see lives changed and to welcome new believers into church. Our church continues to be an essential part of the community in the centre of town. The community larder continues to bring a healthy number of people through our doors from the Sincil bank area. Residents grateful for affordable life essentials and valuable service provided.

Our church plays an integral part in supporting people/families struggling in these ever more challenging economic times. The Foodbank continues to be a lifeline and sadly there is a growing number of people dependant on this support. Val, Carolyne, Carole, Cathy and Heather continue to work collectively to process orders, welcome, support and reassure visitors in need of vital help, they do an amazing job, and we are truly grateful for the great work they do. Our church combines Foodbank Thursday with a coffee morning from 10:30-12:30. Anyone can come along for a brew and social chat, a chance to meet friends and make new ones. Along side the coffee morning is our "New to you shop" run by Heather. There is a wide range of clothing, footwear, books, toys/games and bric a brac. There is also a new range of hand made cards and gift tags. Heather has done a fantastic job processing the stock, passing it on at affordable prices, raising valuable funds for church projects.

The Summertime has seen us resume some of our group activities and we organised a Jubilee party to celebrate the Queen's platinum jubilee. We welcomed around 50 people to a lovely afternoon tea, with fun and games. He had a quiz which Carolyne organised. There was a jubilee bonnet competition, where people decorated a bonnet, there were around a dozen entries and Margaret Hardy was awarded best in show. After the refreshments we recreated Play your cards right, with yours truly playing the part of Brucie. Audience participation was fantastic, plenty of encouragement, "HIGHER", "LOWER!", and "you don't get anything for a pair......." NOT IN THIS GAME!" We got some prizes for the participants which would have blown the Blankety blank budget out of the water. Everyone had a great time, and we closed with the national anthem. The following day we had a service of celebra-

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tion with some rousing hymns and music played so beautifully by Betty on the organ. Everyone was in full voice and there was some last night of the proms style flag waving.

We have a lot to look forward to, and since the easing of the Covid restrictions, like a hibernating hedgehog we have been gradually waking up as a church and bringing back some of the community activities we used to enjoy together in what seemed far more certain times. The circle dancing group met for the first time in two years back in July and their next session has been confirmed for Wednesday 7th September from 2pm in the church hall.

The church craft group continues and has joined forces with a project we used to run called pick n mix. This was a project we used to run with the Sincil bank community where you could come along for a coffee, a chat and games, a bit of a social gathering for anyone who just needed a bit of company and someone to chat to. 
