Dear friends

I begin with a story.

One evening in a country village, a cottage caught on fire. In a few seconds, the thatched roof and the Timbers were ablaze.

There was no fire engine in the remote place and the villagers stood around helpless. Suddenly a young man who had just arrived on the scene cried out, 'What, can nothing be done to save them?'

When no one responded he jumped through the flames and darted into the house. A moment later he emerged, bearing the child under each arm. He had carefully protected them from the flames by hiding them under his coat; he himself was severely burned.

Parents of the two children died in the fire. There was much sympathy for the two children in the village and several people wanted to adopt them.

When the judge arrived to decide who should adopt the children there were two who petitioned the court. The first was the Squire of the village. He had money, position, and a fine house to offer the children. The second petitioner was the man who had rescued the children from the flames.

When the judge asked him what right he had to ask the court for the children he did not answer with words. Instead, he held up his hands that had been severely burned and scarred in their rescue and let them do his arguing for him.

As we approach Easter, I am ever mindful of the sacrificial love of Christ. Like the man who saved the children, Jesus bore the marks on his body as he freely gave his life for us.

As the hymn 'When I survey the wonderous cross' reminds us.

See from his head, his hands, his feet, Sorrow and love flow mingled down; Did e'er such love and sorrow meet, Or thorns compose so rich a crown?

Over the last year during the virus, we have seen many sacrificial acts of love displayed in the lives of many. They also bear the marks of their actions. These moments of self-giving can have huge consequences and long-term effects on many lives. I fear that for many years to come lives will be scared and some will be lost.

But the story of Easter reminds us that there is hope. After the devastation of the cross comes resurrection and New Life. As the church we seek to speak and share this hope with our communities. I have seen this worked out in many ways over the years. May you, as we celebrate God's love for us in the person of Jesus, be blessed and know that 'God Loves You,' and is with you this Easter and beyond.






News from our Churches

All the staff and residents have now received their first Covid 19 vaccination and, although only essential healthcare visitors are entering the home, it is now possible to make enquiries about respite stays or long-term care. One of the present residents came for 3 weeks respite stay and decided to extend the stay to continuing care because she settled in so quickly. That was 3 years ago. Volunteers and visiting preachers on Sunday afternoons are being replaced by Chaplain Geoff conducting 2 services back-to-back in the lounge on Thursdays, as there is not enough space with social distancing for everyone to be present at the same time. As with all residential care settings, Stones Place has put extra cleaning and protective measures in place to try to stop the spread of viruses and residents are keeping in touch with their loved ones by phone or video calls. St Giles

We have continued to meet via Zoom, thanks to John Lawson, every morning to share concerns and pray for each other and for others in our church, community and the wider world.



The Community Larder continues to provide free food and household goods to families in need on Wednesday and Friday mornings.

A recent initiative from the retail trade who have offered food etc to be given out free of charge. These are items that would otherwise go to landfill. At the time of writing (Feb 12) this has been running for 5 weeks on Monday evenings and a total of 343 people have benefited.

The Night Light Crisis Café is due to open on February 22 to run weekly on Tuesday evenings. This is to provide a comfortable, welcoming and relaxed environment for people who have mental health issues.

The church is planning to re-open for worship on Easter Sunday. Later in the month, on April 25, we will be saying farewell to our minister Rev Dr Helen Hooley. This will be a Circuit Service held at St.Giles live streamed to the circuit and beyond.

Monks Road

At the moment we keep in touch with each other through our weekly Friday Connection letter, on our website and our Facebook page. Our Young Spirits group also meets online every week, and folk from around the circuit have "dipped" in to those meetings. We are making plans to link up again with our local community when we can be open, restarting our after-school club and Friday coffee drop-in for carers and parents from 9am onwards in term time. We are using A Methodist Way of Life as our Lent online course this year.

Why do we sing in the Church?



Music in worship goes back to the earliest days of the church. Arrested by the Roman authorities, a group of 'Christians' explained that they met together on a particular day to sing a hymn among themselves 'to the Christ, as to a god'. Saint Augustine wrote that 'the one who sings, prays twice'. Jerome, in the fourth century, wrote: 'Sing to God not with the voice but with the heart.

Although a man be "kakophonos", to use a common expression, if he have good works, he is a sweet singer before God', and in the same century the Council of Carthage gave us a familiar prayer: 'Take care that what you sing with your mouths you believe in your hearts, and what you believe in your hearts you show forth in your works.' Much later, JS Bach wrote: 'The aim and final reason of all music should be nothing else but the glory of God and the refreshment of spirit.'

Many people have said and written much about the place of music in church in their own age. They link music and singing to the Christian life, to the raising of the spirit and the inspiration to go out and spread the good news in words and actions. They say things about belief and singing, about who God is, about why we sing in praise and prayer, and how all peoples are enabled to bring their own particular songs and culture to the worship. But from where you are, what do you say?

Rev Dr Helen Hooley

2021 is going to be a year of change - and particularly for the Hooley household, as we move to the other side of the country in August. I have been invited (subject to conference) to the South West Cumbria United Area - a circuit that is jointly administered by the Methodist Church and the URC. It covers an area of south-west Cumbria, from Barrow in Furness to Millom, with 9 churches. I will take up a post as superintendant, with one other minister in the circuit. I have to admit, I'm quite looking forward to seeing some hills... David starts a new job with Furness College in March, so he will be going ahead of me!

I have had a lovely time in Lincoln, and as I look back, seen a lot of change in the Methodist Church; from coming to Lincoln North circuit, and seeing two circuits join together, a number of colleagues move on to pastures new, and new colleagues arrive to continue the ministry. Some church buildings have closed, but new ministries started, including cafe church at Ingham, the GodPod bus moving to new ownership, and the Eden team growing community engagement on the St Giles estate. I have worked alongside some wonderful capable, and godly people, and I thank you all for your support and the prayer and commitment to the Kingdom of God in this community.

Taking a sabbatical from May-July 2021 seemed like a sensible idea 2 years ago, when 3 of the ministers agreed not to overlap when we were away! I was planning my last Advent / Christmas and Lent / Easter series with churches - but Covid had other ideas, and now it seems you will be praying and planning for a future beyond lockdown without me. My plans are, er, uncertain - conferences and travel are

not clear, but I am hoping to be able to meet up with friends I've not seen for years. I'm intending to study Artificial Intelligence and Ethics - which I now find is a university course in its own right - those of you who followed the A level and GSCE results last summer may recognise how algorithms can disadvantage some people, through no fault of their own. How this can be remedied, and how the Bible's picture of counting the hairs on our heads, and to love our neighbour as ourselves speaks into the issues, so that each person is valued, is something I'm hoping to explore. I'm intending to write something, maybe as a blog, so I will have something to share at the end of the process.

My prayer for you all is:
