We held so-

cially distanced picnics on Saturdays in July, bringing our own food and drink, as a way of reducing isolation for people who had spent lockdown on their own and are also planning our Harvest Festival when again we will be inviting folk to bring their own picnic to eat together after our service."



### STONES PLACE

The residents have welcomed the return of visiting preachers from the Circuit on Sunday afternoons

at 3pm and the small number of volunteers who act as stewards for these services have been glad to see them all again.

Bryan and Barbara Denman and Jim and Viv Welson, who served as stewards over a long period of time, have needed to step down from the role and we thank them for all they have done to make a difference to the lives of older people in residential care at Stones Place.

One of the conditions of volunteering at present is that a Covid lateral flow test needs to be undertaken and the negative result shown on arrival at Stones Place, but this is a small inconvenience compared to the benefits of sharing worship with the residents and becoming part of a close-knit community. Stewards, preachers, staff and visitors need to wear face coverings while in the building until further notice.

It would be good if we could recruit extra stewards, willing to offer 1 Sunday afternoon per month as a minimum, and I will be happy to talk to anyone who would like to know more about the role. We have welcomed Rev Gyula Fiak as our new minister who will officially start in September but has already made his presence felt in the church.


The Community Larder and Free-4-All continue to provide free food and household goods to families in need on Wednesday and Friday mornings.

# **Scam Alert**



In recent days one of our church members has been caught out by an text scam. The original text appeared to be from one of our ministers. There followed a conversation on text between the member and what appeared to be the minister but which was in fact the scammer.

The request was to buy some Google play cards, scratch off the panel on the back and text the numbers over. Unfortunately bank details were also passed on. The given situation was that some people in hospital with cancer needed the cards.

I (and others in the district) also received a similar email last week. The one I received said something along the lines of "I'm in a prayer meeting at the moment so can't respond right now but please could you buy some google gift cards"! The scammers seem to be throwing in a few Christian terms such as "God bless" or "prayer meeting" to try and trick people. They also seem to be using situations that spark an emotional response such as the cancer patients.

Please be very careful. Never reply to such a text or email. Rather contact the person by a different means to check. Never respond to such a request to buy gift cards. Never send gift card numbers on email or text. Never pass your bank details on in such a way.

If you think you have replied to such an email or text then please change your email password. You can let Howard Smedley (<a href="mailto:safeguarding@lincolnshiremethodist.org.uk">safeguarding@lincolnshiremethodist.org.uk</a>) or Alison Godfrey (<a href="mailto:pa@lincolnshiremethodist.org.uk">pa@lincolnshiremethodist.org.uk</a>) know if you have been caught out. In the above situation the Police are being informed.

# **Rev Janet Aileen Mackinder**

Eulogy

Tuesday 2nd June 2021 at 1.10pm Lincoln crematorium

Our hearts are full – full of gratitude for the life and Ministry of Rev Janet we gather our minds together near and far –with our friends on the webcast. There are layers upon layers of gratitude for her this day. Janet's dedication and generous service to friends and to the Methodist Church, she loved, was truly exceptional. She built reciprocal relationships, how many coffees and concerts you've shared dear friends and known she'd always be at the end of that phone? You've known that when she said "I will pray for you" this was not a platitude but a promise kept...

Janet did these things because she 'abided' in Him deeply, sincerely and with discipline which gave her resilience and courage even at her lowest ebb.

Faith planted, rooted, and nurtured in childhood. She was an evacuee child from the London Blitz her and her brother Brian and sister Vivien, moved from Bromley Common to picturesque Otford to live with an Aunt, whilst her father was in the RAF. At the Otford Brethren Mission Hall, aged 8, she made a choice to discover more about Jesus - what a journey you will discover she had from that day. From the day she was born on a Sunday in September 1935 to the day she died on the last Sunday in May this year her soulful life was challenged, provoked, and programmed by that ever-present Spirit's call upon her life. A leader in her adolescence, prefect, and head girl at Swanley Secondary School she grows and flourish-

es. Leaving school at 15years old, Janet ventures into London's fashionable Stores of Gorringes on Buckingham Palace Road and Walpole's on New Bond Street- a talented seamstress and dresser to the genteel women- Janet is encouraged to stretch herself into office and organisational work-she acknowledge her indebtedness to managers who transformed her from a shy girl to a woman with confidence. Thus, fulfilling a sort of prophesy from when she was four, she received a box of chocolates via mum (after a severe bout of tonsillitis) and this card "the little girl who couldn't find her tongue"-she kept this all her life through the kindness of others and God she finds her tongue!

On July 17<sup>th</sup>, 1952, age 17 she formally commits to becoming a Methodist member and all its expectations upon her life-yes 69 year a member. Increasingly independent, aged 21, she moves to Brixton and attends Brixton Hill Methodist Church. Her values and vision for her life were tremendously influenced by the Guides and rangers 'promises' particularly for the possibilities of serving in the wider community, indeed world. She starts a guide pack at Brixton Hill her selfconfidence, self-reliance and self-possession are the embers that are fanned into flame. Then by the Spirit she/he soundly prompted this "little girl who couldn't find her tongue", aged 25 Janet candidates for the Wesleyan Deaconess Order. She passionately embraces her training at Ilkely Deaconess College. The subsequent 19 years are fruitful and expansive. Her probation year was spent at Kingsway Hall with the redoubtable "Dr Soapbox" Lord Soper. In the Barnstaple circuit, in those four years she started two guiding groups and a wives groups all still active-here, she formally completed her Guiding Leadership qualification. In 1967, aged 32, Janet was accepted by the Methodist Missionary Society, then after only terms at Kingsmead Janet sailed to Sierra Leone in June 1968; only one month later, on the day of her Father's funeral, – she collected her post at Freetown to discover this tragic news.

Her work with literacy amongst the girls and women was seminal and once again she set up Guiding groups amongst Muslim as well as Christian communities, the 1<sup>st</sup> Wilberforce Company. On her second tour she became the first female 'resident' chaplain at the Methodist Girls' High School whose motto was Honour before Honours –how Janet embodied that motto. Her passion for Choral Music took her eventually from Freetown Choral Society to North Hykeham and Lincoln Choral Societies and oh how she enjoyed so much her singing and friendships in

both. After 8 years of overseas service, she returned to the UK in June 1976

Horsham became her next posting, and she started the 1<sup>st</sup> Roffey Guides and Brownie unit still active. Within those three years she sensed a call to Presbyteral Ministry and in 1979 aged 49 she makes two wonderful transformational choices. Yes to be one of those early female pioneer Presbyteral Ministers- but Janet marries to an equally dedicated Methodist and Local Preacher Charles 'Charlie' Mackinder she marries him on Wesley Day May 24th 1980 -together they become wonderful help mates to one another-Janet never claimed to be a preacher and I am sure Charles would have guided her when needed –but as one who shared Holy Communion in her presence, her genuine, attentive, considered grace as she shared the elements was profound. She believed Jesus was her vine and herself a branch of that vine. Two subsequent circuits were calling Castleford (now Aire and Calder) yes, she was in the midst of the Miners' strike that year March 84 – March85 many in her six churches were affected directly and indirectly. Then to Castle Donnington (now New Forest East.) Her and Charles HAD TWENTY HAPPY YEARS eventually RETIRING TO North Hykeham. When I prayed with her in hospital she asked me, in her confusion, to pray with her and Charles - as if Charles was there and for them to be together -I 'teared up' but it was one of those lovely, privileged moments.

This evacuee child who was part of that massive wartime Operation called ironically and oddly "Pied Piper" -this 'little girl who couldn't find her tongue' became a an empathetic "Pied-Piper figure' to hundreds if not thousands of young people in Guides. Our Rev Janet had losses to bear - she definitely found her tongue if she disapproved of a behaviour or action! However, her intentions were always for betterment of an action or situation. On one or two occasion I shared morning prayers with her — we'd talked about a common joy gardening-her compost tubs were given to Green Synergy Garden project. I learnt about bird spotting; I'd pick up a prayer shawl she had knitted and prayed over. John Wesley said, "God grant that I may never live to be useless" My goodness Janet, you were mightily useful in prayer and service all your days we thank God he gave the 'little girl her tongue' to pray, speak and act. Amen Thank you God For Rev Janet Mackinder Amen.

# **Margaret Watkinson**

Margaret Green was born in Durham into a Methodist family on November 7<sup>th</sup> 1930. She was an only child, her mother had a difficult delivery and Margaret was nursed by an aunt all night. The midwife was surprised that she was still alive the next day. Margaret's father was a miner and her mother a tailor and seamstress.

Margaret committed her life to Jesus Christ at a young age and trained as a local preacher whilst still in her teens. Her tutor was Rev Kingsley Barrett who later became New Testament professor at Durham University.

She trained as a teacher, art being her main subject and throughout her life she taught reception class. Margaret loved children and looked forward each year to the new intake of small children who weren't able to sit still.

In 1951 David Watkinson was sent to her circuit for a precollegiate year. By the end of the year they were engaged. David trained as a Methodist Minister at Hartley Victoria College. They were married on August 18<sup>th</sup> 1955 when he had completed his training.

In whichever circuit they were stationed Margaret fully supported David and the local churches. The manse was always an open house for meals, hospitality, bible studies and fellowship. Margaret was always involved in youth work, taking youth groups away on holiday and to events such as 'Easter People'.

Margaret was a gifted artist especially in water colours. There are lovely portraits to be treasured of her grandchildren when they were small and many landscapes. She was an excellent seamstress making her own clothes for many years and her knitting skills were amazing.

Before she died Margaret wrote her testimony which was read at her funeral service. She wrote it around the hymn 'In Christ alone'. Margaret bore witness to the transforming love of God revealed through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ and the New Life she experienced when she committed her life to Him.

# "A Generations worth of change within a Decade!"

UK and global Agriculture are facing a perfect storm of challenges:

- The Climate emergency applies to all peoples their cultures, faiths, resources and industries not least agriculture and food in the UK.
- Restructuring of global trade agreements which also impacts movements of labour to facilitate production from field to fork. Shortages of women and men are already having damaging effects in Lincolnshire and other crop producing areas. There are significant shortages of European labour to harvest flowers and vegetables. This week Bakkavor Newark who make and supply cakes to Waitrose etc advertising for labour across Lincoln City this has not happened before.
- Already trading and retailing are in fewer centres of power, control and distribution. Note attempts to buy-out Morrison's and the failed alliance of Sainsbury and Asda UK—this shrinking of the market place requires a different ethical and value driven food system to protect workforces in the supply chain!
- In the UK a shift away from direct payments for farming land to support payments for 'public benefits' ie increase environment projects, access etc also modest payments to leave farming and few incentives for those who want enter farming. Andersons (consultants) estimate that the number of full-time UK farm businesses will drop from about 54,000 in 2020 to just

42,300 by 2030 – a fall of 11,700 or about 20%. Some other estimates are far more gloomy I personally think in some sectors ie beef it could be 40% decline and I think overall nearer 35%+

The food system globally is fractured, hugely wasteful and abusive and depletes rather than replenishes not just soils and water but communities too. Wider facts are, globally 33% of soils are moderately or highly degraded, 20% of world's aquifers are over exploited. Of the 1.2 billion people who work in agriculture 80% or 500million are smallholder farms. Mainly women on these small holdings produce half of the world's food they account for 43% of the global agricultural workforce. 60% of all children engaged in labour work in agriculture.

At the same time, land and agriculture as a whole can and potentially will be a major source of mitigating the worst effects of climate brokenness. It will require further 'joined up' thinking by the UK government and global leaders to ensure a just, ethical and value driven solutions.

A rethink of some of our theological premises to address issues that need to be rooted in gratitude rather than consuming—reclaiming Paradise on earth 'kin-dom' and community wholeness. In this past year I read a wonderful book by Robin Wall Kimmerer "Braiding Sweetgrass—indigenous wisdom, scientific knowledge and the teachings of plants". Within it she tells of an indigenous recitation that the children shared daily between them—dwelling in love and gratitude!

I quote the end of "We have now arrived at the place where we end our words. Of all the things we have named, it is not our inten-
