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Journeys



I have been following the news reports about migrants arriving on our shores. Almost 40,000 people have crossed the Channel in small boats so far in 2022. This is the highest number since these figures began to be collected in 2018. In 2021, the total was 28,526 people, while in 2020 it was 8,404. In recent weeks the government have been under pressure over how people reaching our shores are

treated. The <u>Universal Declaration of Human Rights</u> (Article 14), states that everyone has the right to seek and enjoy asylum from persecution in other countries. We need to continue to pray for this situation and that it might be resolved.

We all make journeys in our lifetime. Some of those journeys are easy; others not so easy. I dare say that over the Christmas period many of you will make journeys to see family and friends or they might come to see you.

The story of Christmas includes a journey. The one that Mary and Joseph made under orders from the Government who declared everyone must travel to their place of birth. It is during this journey that Mary heavily pregnant and Joseph find themselves without accommodation and everywhere seems to be full to overflowing. After much searching they were offered a room, a stable to rest in. It was in this place that Jesus was born.

Once again in our churches we will tell the story of that first Christmas and be reminded of who Jesus is and why he needed to come. Humankind had become corrupt and distanced from God and God's kingdom values. Jesus was sent to teach us how to live lives of love for God and neighbour and ultimately reconcile

us to God. This would make it possible for us to make a new start. We have an opportunity to share the message once again, but the work will continue beyond Christmas. I love these words:

When the star in the sky is gone

When the Kings and princes are home

When the shepherds are back with their flocks

The work of Christmas begins:

To find the lost

To heal the broken

To feed the hungry

To release the prisoner

To rebuild the nations

To bring peace among the people

Dear Friends,

We are settling in to Lincoln and enjoying getting to know you all as we travel around the circuit. We want to say 'Thank You' for the warm welcome we are continuing to receive and for the wonderful home that has been prepared for us. If you were at our Welcome Service, you will know that my parents were born in Hull and we often travelled through Lincoln to visit our grand-parents as I grew up in Canterbury, Kent. 3 of my grandparents were members of Derringham Methodist Church in Hull. I used to help my granddad give out the hymn books.

I was born in Altrincham, Cheshire and lived in Hazel Grove for the first 6 years of my life. Then we moved to a small village outside Canterbury. I have 2 brothers, Andrew and Nick and a sister, Helen. We were involved at St Peter's Methodist Church in Canterbury. From school, I went to North Riding Teacher Training College to begin a 4-year teaching degree. The 2nd year was spent at Leeds University. It was whilst I was there that I made the decision to transfer and I completed a degree in Theology and Religious Studies.

After a gap year, I went to work in a Children's Home in Peterborough. I started attending Dogsthorpe Methodist Church and it was within my church family there that my inherited faith grew to a living faith. After 2 years, I was supported to complete my Diploma in Social Work. I returned to the Children's Home and 18 months later, I was seconded for 6 months to work in the Looked After Children's Team. Towards the end of that time, I sensed that God was calling me to something else.

In 2000, I served as the leader of a 'Seed Team Mission' at Gravesend Methodist Church. It was part of the work of the Methodist Minister, Rev Rob Frost. I then applied for Foundation Training and was sent to study at the Wesley Study Centre in Durham. I discerned a call to presbyteral ministry, which was confirmed by the Methodist Church. I have served in the Runcorn Circuit, the Lancaster Circuit, and the Newcastle West Circuit. Five years ago, I was approved as an Adoptive parent and Rebecca and I became mum and daughter on the 5th November 2018. This photo was taken on our 4th anniversary. We are definitely God's gift to each other.



News from our Churches

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Bailgate Luncheon Club



Today Tuesday 18th October 2022, Bailgate Church celebrated 40 years of serving lunch on Tuesday.

The original purpose was to serve dinners to elderly members of the church and community who would otherwise always eat alone.

On 17th November 1981 an initial meeting was held to discuss the possibility of holding a weekly Luncheon Club at Bailgate Methodist church.

They would need the kitchen to be fitted out. Cookers, freezer, fridge, trolley, pans, cutlery, china and serviettes, cooking equipment etc. The more it was discussed the more things they realised would be needed and other agencies involved, such as electricity and gas board, plumbers and electricians, insurance etc. They would need to contact as many people as possible for financial help and draw up a list of people who would benefit from the dinners. No cellphones or internet then, all houses in the area were 'letterboxed '.

- Lunches would cost 80 pence, soup an extra 10p and a taxi service 10p.
- ♦ No smoking would be allowed.
- ♦ Environmental Health would need to check.
- Need a waste bin and a good butcher.
- Need to avoid other club days.

Between them they arranged to write letters to benefactors, circuit prayer fellowships, Bible study groups, Newsletter and Messenger.

Throughout November of that year the hard work continued. Enquiries were made for various equipment and lists of people drawn up of those who would like to attend. Close co-operation was formed between Bailgate and Care of the Elderly. At the end of the month a plan was drawn up for the Kitchen.

As time went on more and more people were co-opted to help for advice and to source equipment. At that time several schools had stopped doing hot dinners for children and a company was traced at Nottingham that had cookers and kitchen equipment from schools in Lincoln. Much of the equipment was

and kitchen equipment from schools in Lincoln. Much of the equipment was bought from them at a cost of £40, and most of it is still in use today. A member found a stall at Lincoln Market that sold cutlery and china. Donations came from various benefactors and fund-raising activities included coffee mornings and jumble sale.

On 8th February the Church Council voted unanimously to allow the Luncheon

Club to go ahead but without financial help from the church; the Luncheon Club would pay for its own gas and heating.

Throughout the following month work continued to source equipment.

May 1982 the Church Council gave approval for units in the kitchen, but not wall units working with Michael Hildred and the property committee.

July 1982 the names of possible people going to attend and a list of volunteers willing to help was drawn up.

Finally on 14th September 1982 the first meal of the Bailgate Luncheon Clubwas served.



Brisket, Yorkshire puddings, mashed potato, carrots and cauliflower, followed by apple crumble and custard. There were 38 clients at that initial lunch and it has not stopped since!!

Our annual Folk Carol service will be held on Sunday, 18 December, at 3pm to which everyone is invited. We wish you all a blessed and happy Christmas.


North Hykeham
